Political season is in full swing. On the national level, what we have been witnessing is almost too bizarre to believe. It's not hard to see why so many people for the first time in generations say they are truly concerned for the future of our country.

Closer to home we have a governor in Illinois who has made union-bashing a priority, even as the state is embroiled in budget nightmares. In Kansas (a "Right to Work" state) things have gotten so bad under Gov. Sam Brownback that officials are having to cut education spending and raid the highway fund to pay the bills. Brownback, by the way, has the lowest approval rating of any governor, according to one recent poll.

Disappointingly, Missouri's Legislature has succeeded in passing a paycheck protection (deception) bill, which Gov. Jay Nixon vetoed but lawmakers will attempt to override. RTW has thankfully seen less interest in the state capital following last year's raucous defeat. With voters choosing a new governor later this year, our support for Chris Koster is relentless. Each contender in the crowded Republican field supports turning

Missouri into a RTW state, meaning anyone but Koster would be disastrous for middle class families.

For president, our international union is throwing its considerable support behind Hillary Clinton. Presidential politics is usually divisive even within the parties, and certainly all of the candidates have passionate supporters and fierce detractors. At the end of the day what matters is who has the best shot at winning and who is promising to fight for your job, your family and your future. Our council covers a large territory from southern Illinois to the state of Kansas. With so many of us spread out so far apart it's easy to feel disconnected from our brothers and sisters. CENTER STAGE

A Carpenter apprentice steps into the national spotlight.



When presidential candidate Hillary Clinton announced a stop in St. Louis just days ahead of the Missouri primary, the Regional Council answered the call. The Clinton campaign wanted the Carpenters' training center in Affton to be the site of her rally, which was to touch heavily on the challenges facing America's skilled workforce.

"They told me that they needed an apprentice to introduce Hillary Clinton and of course I said 'yes' immediately. What an honor to introduce somebody who's done such good things for labor," third-term apprentice Nathan Garrett said.

A 28-year-old from the city's Soulard neighborhood, Garrett took the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to stress three points about labor unions that he wanted the crowd of more than 1,000 Clinton supporters and the national press corps to know:

- We must make sure young people learn about opportunities in the skilled trades.
- We have to protect the interests of the companies that employ us.
- Be ready to welcome immigrants, minorities and women into the tent.

"We need a bigger tent and part of Hillary's message is tearing down walls, not putting them up," Garrett said. "I think the challenge for us as a union is to find the common ground between the interests of companies and our interests. We need to make a bigger pie and not just fight over what there is."

The United Brotherhood of Carpenters, along with many of the country's largest labor unions, has endorsed Clinton's campaign.

In a crowd packed with union workers, the presidential hopeful drew rousing cheers when proposing tax credits to spur more high-quality apprenticeship programs like the one offered by the Carpenters and our signatory contractors.

"We are going to make sure that careers in the building trades remain a ladder right into the middle-class," Clinton said. "That's why I stood with unions and with Governor Nixon in the fight against the so-called Right to Work bill. You beat it back in this state. That was a big victory and we can do it again."



Clinton's remarks were an acknowledgement that labor unions in Missouri and across the country are under attack. She drew a sharp contrast between herself and others vying for the White House.

"It's not fair that only people from well-off families get to have internships and apprenticeships. We need to open the door for every young American," she said. "When Democrats are in the White House the economy does better. Organized labor does better. Young people do better."

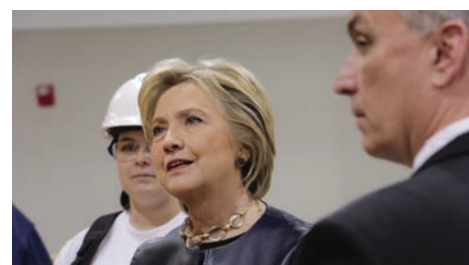
In a tight contest Clinton narrowly beat Sen. Bernie Sanders to win Missouri's Democratic primary. The results were so close that it took Sanders two days to finally concede the Show-Me State.

Both Clintons stumped in Missouri leading up to primary day. The former president appeared at the Kansas City Carpenters' Training Facility the day before his wife's rally at the St. Louis school, confirming the close bond between the Clinton campaign and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters - an early and vocal supporter.

"Too many people in too many places have been left out. She will change that," Bill Clinton told supporters in Kansas City.

With unions experiencing a chipping away at the gains that took decades of struggle to build, Clinton is eager to reassure skilled tradespeople that hers is the strongest voice for middle-class America.

As for Nathan Garret, she quipped: "He did an excellent job. I think I may have found my running mate."

How healthy is your wallet?

CRC launches online financial course.

Our parents and grandparents had an easier time managing their money. The world was a simpler place before the proliferation of credit cards (the average person owns three of them,) mutual funds, 401(k) plans, adjustable rate mortgages, and the many other often confusing financial decisions we make.

Understanding increasingly complex finances has become so challenging that 17 states now require high school students take some type of money management course before they graduate. Only 57% of American adults can pass a basic financial literacy test, and teenagers are especially deficient.

Helping people make sense of their personal finances (or dig themselves out of crushing debt) is a booming business. Ads for money managers and debt counseling services are ubiquitous on radio and across the Internet, while many employers offer classes on it to help ensure they have happy and productive workers.

In February, the CRC launched a free online financial education course available to all members.

"This is not a mandatory course for our members, but it's really something a lot of people should consider and would benefit from," the Carpenters' director of training, Dr. John Gaal, said.

The eight-hour course is broken down into 14 lessons, each focusing on various aspects of personal finance, including credit cards, debit cards, purchasing a car, and buying a home. Users also get help understanding W-2s, W-4s, payday loans and annual percentage rates in an interactive online format.

Barbara Flowers, an education specialist with the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis, which assisted the CRC in implementing the course, said prior generations had few if any credit cards and often rented until they could save enough money to buy a home.

Easier access to credit and loans has put Americans in the position of making financial decisions that they may not fully understand or are prepared to pay off.

Human nature plays a role, too.

“A lot of people are very optimistic and feel they have a nice job and are going nowhere but up. As we found in this most recent financial crisis, the markets can change and a lot of people found their wealth disappear overnight,” Flowers said.

Realizing how vulnerable many Americans are, the federal government stepped in and created a new agency to address the financial literacy problem. Formed in 2011, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau was a direct response to the Great Recession. It tracks complaints and promotes “fairness and transparency for mortgages, credit cards, and other consumer financial products and services.”

In the private sector courses like the one offered by the Carpenters are a growing trend. Having employees losing sleep over money troubles and bringing their anxiety to work is cause for concern.

“If you’re on a jobsite and worrying about how you’re going to make this month’s mortgage payment, your mind is not where it’s supposed to be,” Gaal said. “This is absolutely a safety issue for our union.”

Bruce Bird, coordinator at the Carpenters’ training center in Cape Girardeau, had been developing the

online course when he passed away unexpectedly in January of last year. “We kind of had to start over and recruit a new group of people for the project,” Gaal said. “This is really a tribute to Bruce because he laid the groundwork and we just filled in the rest.”

A handful of members have already completed the course from their home computers or phones, including Brian Hoette of Local 97.

“It’s good all-around financial advice on budgets, car loans, house loans and retirement. It’s pretty comprehensive stuff,” he said.

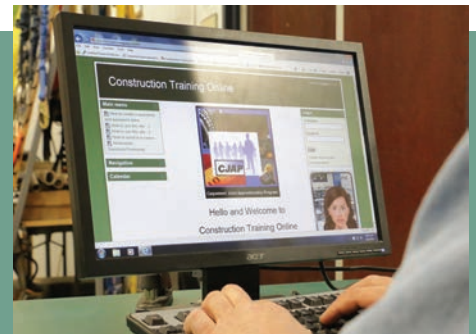
“I think this could be especially good for our younger members, but it takes self-discipline to apply these lessons in real life.”

April is National Financial Literacy Month, drawing attention to the more than \$2 trillion we carry in consumer debt. One in four Americans report having no extra cash; making it impossible to escape the burden of living paycheck to paycheck.

Knowing how to read the fine print and avoid foolish decisions puts people on the path to financial health and eases some heavy burdens.

Flowers believes the easiest mistake to make is taking on too much debt without realizing that your financial situation can change without warning.

“We feel like there’s always tomorrow,” she said.



Team Effort

Mentor program becomes priority



Frustrated with the number of apprentices leaving the union in their first year, the regional council is rolling out the welcome mat with a plan aimed at newly-initiated members.

“Mentoring is about having a one-on-one relationship with the new people coming into our organization,” Representative Dave Wilson told hundreds of delegates gathered at the council’s April meeting in Columbia, Missouri.

Some locals have had their own versions of a mentoring program over the years but the focus now is on creating a uniform approach with a consistent message and game plan; a strategic goal outlined by Executive Secretary-Treasurer Al Bond to address member recruitment and retention.

Delegates voted to create a permanent mentoring committee and to allow new members to start attending local meetings immediately, where they can get accustomed to the union and introduced to fellow carpenters.

Representative Paul Higgins said a conversation with a corporate executive convinced the CRC that when it comes to mentoring timing is everything,

“She’s the head of human resources for a major corporation and we asked her what the corporate world is doing with mentoring. She said they engage their new employees within 30 days. If they’re not engaged in that first month they lose them because those new hires have no commitment to the company,” Higgins said.

Under the new program the union’s goal is to make contact with each rookie carpenter in the first five days of apprenticeship orientation. Designated mentors will receive training on how to talk to new members, establish a rapport and offer the kind of support that will keep apprentices interested, involved and getting the most from their union membership.

Beyond that, program organizers stress that the responsibility for retaining people falls on each and every member in the regional council.

“Every time you help someone on a jobsite or show them a safer, better way of doing things you are a mentor. Everybody in this union is a mentor,” Representative Dan Barger said. “This is about everybody out there in the field working together as a team.”

The Carpenters’ International Training Center in Las Vegas teaches useful classes on the technical skills needed to perform on a jobsite, but the United Brotherhood also has long preached the importance of “soft skills” such as leadership, communication, goal setting, coaching, and motivating. Those courses are taught in what the UBC calls its “300 Hitters” course. Organizers of the regional council’s new mentoring initiative want anyone selected to serve as a mentor to attend the 300 Hitter class, since the skills taught there are the same techniques that will be needed to inspire and motivate young members.

Delegate Christopher Albright (Local 1839) applauded the announcement of the new program and believes it is exactly what the union needs now. “The people coming up behind us are the guys who will someday be paying for our pensions, our retirements and strengthening our union. I think mentoring is the future of the Carpenters,” he said.

ORGANIZING REPORT

We have gone from a council with many different contracts (and within those contracts many different work rules) to a council with a regional contract and different addendums through the various associations we deal with across our three-state council. This has been a win-win for all of our contractors. We had many differences in our training programs, but now we have consistency with each local area working closely to fit the needs of their contractors and members.

We have learned that even though we have become one, we are still very different based on our demographics and area cultures. There are many different techniques and styles for our organizing teams within our great council. We have implemented and utilized the Resource Management Program for over four years now. This program has given the entire council more direction and has kept us in check. For our selected targets this is the way to keep our information correct and up to date. It is not a fix-all but yet another tool for us to better serve our members and contractor base. We have used the program for a multitude of crafted tasks for each area. We are now using the program to meet our needs for manpower recruitment council-wide. It is, and will continue to be, an excellent program for membership gains as well as retention.

We have used the program over the last four years to protect and procure our area standards throughout our council.

In the St. Louis and southern Illinois areas we continue our day-to-day battles with small retail and restaurant national chains. Most of these projects are stand-alone wood frame structures or small tenant finish projects. We have used the Area Standards

Campaigns against Darden Restaurants, Jack in the Box, Texas Road House, Subway, Pita Pit, Jets Pizza and Firehouse Subs. We also took on Ross Dress for Less, Verizon Wireless, Dollar General, Dollar Tree, Family Dollar, and most recently Lucky's Market & Fresh Thyme Farmer's Market. The ownership of these stores is in itself a problem of commitment. We have spent much to protect what our contractors historically and traditionally have been a part of. We owe it to our membership to maintain and create every man hour we possibly can. To date, the Darden Restaurant Group, Jack in the Box, Subway, Jets Pizza, Firehouse Subs, Verizon Wireless and Lucky's Market & Fresh Thyme Farmer's Market have committed to us for future work.

Throughout our region we have used our Market Recovery money to maintain our presence in other wood frame projects. On most of these targeted projects it is usually drywall, siding or roofing that needs the help. We have to pick and choose very carefully what site to fund and which sub will receive targeting.

Since 2010 we have been building relationships with developers and general contractors on our western side of the state. We have worked on single family homes in Springfield, Missouri, finishing out a development for one of our partners. We created man hours on numerous multi-family projects in Kansas City and the Columbia area. Some of these projects we helped finance. Others we helped out with Target Money. Some were just simply awarded the bid solely on their record of responsibility as a contractor. We presently have worked close to 300,000 man hours in western Missouri on residential projects where there was

no presence before. This has been a full team effort in creating these man hours.

In the downtown St. Louis area we are mid-stream on the \$380 million City Arch River project, which encompasses the Arch grounds improvements broken into several parts: a major change to the entrance and exit from downtown to Interstates 70/44; Kiener Plaza improvements; Ely Luther Square improvements; Old Court House improvements; Leonor K. Sullivan Blvd. improvements along the river and the complete renovation of the Jefferson Memorial Museum. McCarthy, KCI, BSI and Kozney Wagner are the contractors on site.

The Arcade Building downtown is a \$118 million renovation project supervised by the Paric Corporation. The Arcade was one of the first 22-story high rise reinforced concrete buildings built at the turn of the 20th century. It is being developed into 282 apartments, classrooms, offices, art gallery and an auditorium for Webster University. On this project our partner Paric has even self-performed installation of much of the glass in the store fronts on the interior of the building as well as refurbishing most of the marble that covered the walls for historical tax credits.

Across city/county lines we are eyeing \$4.7 billion of updated improvements to the Metropolitan Sewer District. This project was started three years ago and is estimated to be completed in 2023. It is a total overhaul of the

storm sewers including all of the lines, junction boxes and lift stations. This project has already created hundreds of thousands of man hours for our contractors specializing in this sector of work.

Our residential market in the St. Louis and southern Illinois areas are starting to see an increase in new home starts. Two of our larger residential subcontractors (building mostly homes consisting of single family, attached villas, and apartments) worked 983,767 man hours last year. Throughout that year, these contractors employed over 1,300 carpenters on their payrolls. The thousands of homes that these carpenters build will more than equal up to the man hours captured on the other billion-dollar projects mentioned throughout this report.

As you can see from just a few reports on projects in progress and other projects soon to start, the St. Louis-Kansas City Carpenters Regional Council's future is looking prosperous.

But let's not forget that we are always looking for new and creative ways to make man hours for our membership. This process does not happen overnight and can take years to build relationships with our business partners. Let me close by saying: Only by being the leaders in our industry will we continue to grow the Carpenters union.

Safety First

Highlights from the 2016 SafetyCon

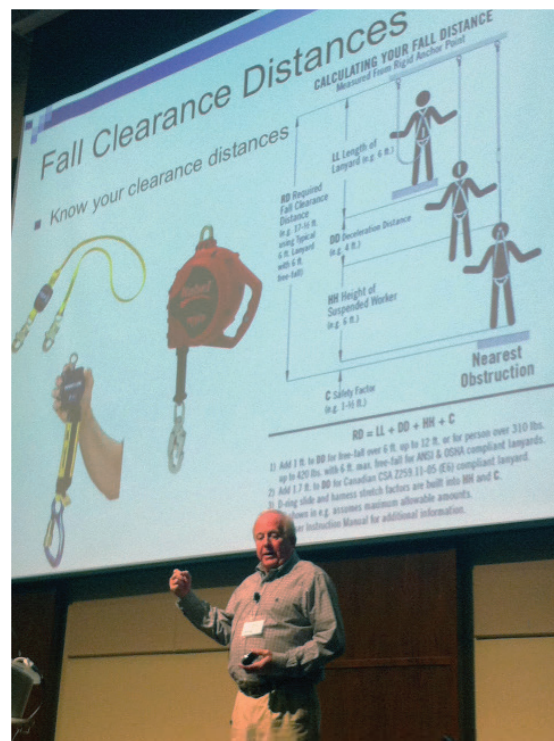
The 2016 Southwestern Illinois SafetyCon was held on the campus of Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville.

The day-long conference was dedicated to the awareness and education of safety in the construction workforce. The top three most-cited OSHA violated standards (fall protection, hazard communication and scaffolding) were all included workshops during the conference, providing real-life examples from the guest speakers, including Chad Durbin, a construction worker who was injured on the job in 2005.

The conference was sponsored by the Southern Illinois Builders Association and the Southern Illinois Construction Advancement Program. More than 150 construction professionals attended the conference, including 40+ carpenter members.

Safety is one of the most important concerns on a jobsite and one of the main reasons for construction related deaths each year.

Conferences like SafetyCon remind us all of the hazards associated with our jobs and how to prevent those risks.



Cheltenham Construction Services held two safety training classes focused on its revised Residential Fall Protection Plan at the Nelson/Mulligan Carpenters Training Center.

More than 80 members participated in the class.

Safety Director Barry Stelzer, John Mormann (Belleville CJAP instructor), Todd Erdman (STL CJAP instructor) and Lynda Mueller Drendel (STL CJAP instructor) assisted Cheltenham owner Vic Hoerstkamp in presenting the curriculum.



Young girls without much exposure to science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) experience decreased interest in those subjects by age 14. Research shows that events that engage girls in STEM activities influence them to continue in one of the STEM fields.

The first-ever statewide all girls STEM Event brought together seventh-graders from across Missouri, engaging them in engineering and mathematical activities designed by instructors from Missouri University of Science & Technology and by industry professionals.

CJAP was an exhibitor and presenter at the conference. Tony Blackstock (Springfield CJAP) and Matt Hurley (Jefferson City CJAP) introduced the girls to the apprenticeships' new

Augmented Welding Systems. Girls were able to experience welding on virtual plates. They also got to dress like a welder, hold a MIG gun and have their pictures taken. Informational packets from all of the Missouri CJAPs were available to the counselors and instructors from their prospective areas.

Cathy Cook (Southern Illinois CJAP) and Matt Singer (Jefferson City CJAP) also volunteered, showing the 450 girls in attendance a PowerPoint presentation on bridge engineering.

Students had to choose a bridge design and then build it out of straws and tape, with a time limit. Once the bridges were finished they were put to the test to see if their design could stand the weight test.

Wies was selected from a group of other qualified apprentices, recognized for his top scores in the classroom, as well as his commitment to quality and outstanding attention to detail on shop projects.

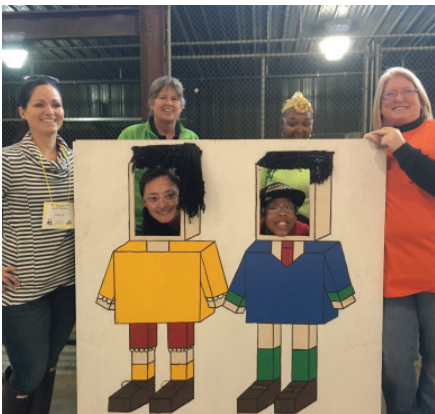
The award was presented during the Painting and Decorating Foundation's Finishing Touch Awards Banquet.
